Sermon Series on James:

Becoming a Child of the King (Parts 3 & 4)

Continuing with the 9-part series on the Book of James, Titled "Becoming a Child of the King."

At the end of the first chapter, James 1:19 - 27, James' writing focuses on how to transition from a passive useless faith into a functioning faith. What is the difference between passive and functioning?

Think of an air conditioner that blows only hot air. It is officially working, but to fulfill the purpose of cooling a house, it must blow cool, refreshing air. Functioning faith is seen in the way we use our time and how we act. Though the book of James, God is calling us to grow in our faith, this allows God to use us for his glory.

James starts with three simple directives:

- \Rightarrow Talk less
- \Rightarrow Listen more
- \Rightarrow Be slow to anger

These three directives can be used to shape your experience as a Christian, tap into your deeper desires to please God, and find direction in the freedom of God's word.

The directives help turn the desire to be a better Christian into the action called to us by the Bible. It allows us to be willing to give yourself to others without hesitation. Helping those in need is the word of God turned into action, which is the pinnacle of being a functioning Christian, according to James.

Love He has also set eternity in the human heart; yet no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end. Ecclesiastes 3:11 (NIV)

As James starts Chapter 2, he asks not to forget about our own vulnerability. To be a child of the King means to hold onto the same vulnerability that Jesus experienced. Remembering that we are not promised health and wealth. Jesus never sought out wealth but forsook his rights as God as he surrendered to the cross. On the cross, Jesus gave the thing that we are needed the most, forgiveness. The forgiveness that Jesus gave with his last breaths to the thief on the cross is the same forgiveness promised to us. The cross is an example of vulnerability and forgiveness in a world that is cruel, unkind, and unfair.

Within vulnerability is grace. In Jesus' times, it was thought that to be poor and infirmed was to be cursed with the judgment of God. But Jesus rejected this idea and sought out the poor, the weak, the ill, and the marginalized. He said, it is not the well who need a doctor but the sick (Matt. 9:12) —He offers this same grace to us and expects us to offer it to others. James tells us that we will be judged by the measure we use to judge others. And he reminds us that grace given is grace received.

Further, we are asked to show mercy. Mercy is even more challenging to offer than grace because mercy requires faith that functions through having compassion for

others. Whereas grace gathers in the lowest levels, mercy is how someone responds when we receive that grace. Mercy triumphs over judgment because mercy is the manifestation of functional faith, and we are justified and saved by faith.

God is calling all Christians to grow in their faith so that they may be mature. To grow as a—child of the King is to have faith that is functional. Christians with functioning faith have a natural desire to please God, intently study the Bible (the law of freedom), and learn to show mercy to others who are less fortunate than us. By the power of the Holy Spirit, these simple directives transform us into children of God who have functioning faith and are maturing into people who act like Jesus.


She will be happy to coordinate a time to meet you at the church or to arrange a way to get your meal to the church.


