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Becoming a Child of the King Sermon Series on James (Parts 5 – 7)

As we continue to explore the themes and messages in the book of James, in these next 3 sections, we start to explore the apparent contradictions between James and the writings of the Apostle Paul. One of these becomes apparent in the treatment of the balance of works and faith. Are we saved by faith alone, as the Apostle Paul tells us, or must we have works that

accompany our faith to truly show that we are people of God as James tells us?

Perhaps, these aren't contradictions but only different ways of phrasing similar thoughts. Maybe both men are trying to lead us to a living faith. In the final verses of Chapter 2, James is continuing to try to reach Christians. He is pleading for our salvation. He explains that we are offered a saving faith in this relationship with God. It is a faith that grows. To grow this faith relationship, we must grow trust with God.

To strengthen the bond of trust, we have to do things that fill us and reinforce the bond. By reading the scripture, remembering God's faithfulness, and surrounding ourselves with people who testify to God's goodness, we strengthen the foundation of our trust in God.

James then says that it is through works and helping others that we show our bond with God. We exhibit our relationship of faith to the world when we show ourselves to be people who are willing to give others the help they need. We offer our belief in this trusting relationship as we bring to others the same trust that we have found in our relationship with God. Through these works, faith grows in ourselves and in others.



May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Romans 15:13

Moving into Chapter 3, James picks out specific things that stand between this relationship with God. He is forthright in his assessment. He states clearly that a lot is expected of those that guide others for God's glory.

The power of the words we use is significant and can be harmful should we not take the time to think about the things we say. The tongue is small, but it has a huge impact. We must watch against gossiping, complaining, and negativity. This is true not only of what we say aloud but of the ways we use words to talk about ourselves. Not only can your words hurt others, but they can hurt ourselves. When words are negative and discouraging, they can formulate a hellish influence.

Our words can both praise and curse. James warns that cursing and negativity take away from the good our words can accomplish. Be aware of the source of your language. Does what you say come from a place of humility and wisdom, or is it based in boastfulness and pride.

What will your words renew and affirm in yourself and to others? When we use our words to uplift others, we ourselves are renewed and find peace. Wisdom can be found in language that is pure, peace-loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy, impartial, and sincere.

In Part 7 of the series, James 4: 1 -10 tells us again that James is writing to remind his readers why we are here. We are here to be in an intimate relationship with God. More personal than a marriage and requiring the same amount of care and dedication. The burdens of this world will overtake us and cause us to forget why we are here. They cause us to forget our focus and to lose God in the priorities of the world. We become distracted, and those distractions change our priorities. The priorities of the world become more important than maintaining this relationship with God.

Though God is jealous, He is not vengeful as he continually tries to reconnect with us. God continues to offer grace and redemption as a way for us to reconnect with him. When we can pull our focus out of the world and, with humility, turn back to God, God will meet us right where we are. In fact, he proved this in the form of Jesus, sacrificing himself on the cross. This was the ultimate example of humility, freely given, to set us up for a continued relationship with God.

Each moment, God stands at the door to our life and knocks; if the door is opened, he sits with you in intimate fellowship, and the relationship continues.

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
