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Sermon Thoughts The End of James and the Beginning of Thessalonians

The Sermons on September 13th and 20th focus on the end of the book of James and the beginning of the book of Thessalonians. Two books that are written by 2 apostles, James and Paul, that had different views on Christianity.

James ends his direction in the final verses of the Book of James with some final advice to Christians. He is clear that Jesus has saved us from sin, but he cautions that we will still be held accountable. Accountable not for our sin, be for our lives. What have we done our lives? How have we utilized the gifts we were given: Our time, our

matters. ¹³ Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise. 14 Is anyone among you

sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. James 5:13 - 14

In other words, don't be alone in this world. Call for reinforcements. Boost yourself up and call on others to help you maintain your course with Jesus.

If you have sin in your life, find a trusted friend or confidant. Let them help you. Do not wallow in guilt, regret, or shame. As Christians, you are not meant to live in that space. You are meant to bring your shortcomings into the light. To allow others to see that Christian life is not perfect, but it is forgiven. We, as Christians, are meant to bring the light of Jesus' forgiveness to each other and to ourselves.



"Be strong, and let your heart take courage, all you who wait for the LORD!"

Psalms 31:24

This may mean that we face troubles and life situations that seem impossible to reconcile. Mountains that seem impossible to climb. But James reinforces the point that Paul made in 2 Corinthians 5. Although no one is righteous except Jesus, we can move mountains (face hard times) because we have the righteousness of Jesus on us. And because we are covered in this grace, we can be a comfort and an ambassador to each other. We can speak into someone's life with the authority of Jesus and encourage each other in Christ. We become reconciled to God through the cross. One of the many ways this power exerts itself is to help us minimize the trouble we face so that we may become a blessing to someone else's life.

And so James ends his instruction, and we move to Paul's letter to the church at Thessalonica. Paul, Simon, and Timothy were led to this city by a vision. They went straight to the temple, and their words caused unrest and riots. They finally left, probably for the safety of their hosts. But then Paul wrote this letter. A letter to a church that still had an active memory of the crucifixion.

And Paul begins with I pray for you, we remember your devotion, we know you are ready. He reminds them (and us), you heard me. You listened to the gospel. The gospel has power. It is work produced by faith, labor prompted by love, and endurance inspired by hope. We are meant to share the gospel. The success of the church depends on us sharing the gospel. But we must know that the gospel is more than mere words. The gospel is power. Within the message of the gospel, you will find all that is needed for success.

The gospel brings the message of Jesus into focus for us to believe in him. It asks us to focus and believe that Jesus is who he says he is. We don't need to be powerful when we share the gospel; we just need to be real. We need to step into the storm. Christianity is to volunteer to step inside the storm, to be hit by the lightening of the gospel, soaked by the rain of God's grace, and lifted up to the clouds of hope.

Thessalonians is said to speak to the end of times. That has been on a lot of people's minds. And this book talks about a time of tribulation. But as Christians, we know a rescue is coming. God's compassion and mercy is all we need.

Wisdom In A Cup

A group of alumni, highly established in their careers, got together to visit an old university professor. Conversation soon turned in to complaints about stress in work and life.

Offering his guests coffee, the professor went to the kitchen and returned with a large pot of coffee and an assortment of cups - porcelain, plastic, glass, crystal, some plain looking, some expensive, some exquisite - telling them to help themselves to the coffee. When all the students had a cup of coffee in hand, the professor said:

If you noticed, all the nice looking, expensive cups were taken up, leaving behind the plain and cheap ones. While it is but normal for you to want only the best for yourselves, that is the source of your problems and stress. Be assured that the cup itself adds no quality to the coffee in most cases. It's just more expensive and in some cases even hides what you drink. What all of you really wanted was coffee,



not the cup. But you went for the best cups, and then began eyeing each other's cups."

The professor continued, "Now consider this: Life is the coffee, and the jobs, money and position in society are the cups. They are just tools to hold and contain life, and the type of cup we have does not define, nor change the quality of life we live."

Sometimes, by concentrating only on the appearance of the cup, we fail to enjoy the coffee God has provided us.
